Interdisciplinarity

Discipline: A concentrated and bounded academic field of study. The fruits.


Interdisciplinarity: Incorporates several fields of study to allow collaboration among diverse disciplines to broaden education, to gain understanding, to create new concepts and approaches, and/or to problem solve. The fruit smoothie.



Multidisciplinarity: Drawing on information and methods from two or more disciplines. Distinct from "interdisciplinary" in that it generally does not imply integrating fields together into a new field. The fruit bowl.

Transdisciplinarity: Refers to bridging the gap between the academic disciplines and the world outside the academy. How do we extend the impact of the fruits of our learning?

PBL is a teaching method in which students gain knowledge and skills by working for an extended period of time to investigate and respond to an authentic, engaging, and complex question, problem, or challenge.

Key elements of PBL include: sustained inquiry; authenticity; reflection; student voice & choice; critique & revision; public product.
