What Makes Writing Meaningful?

Three writing center professionals compiled their research into a book titled *The Meaningful Writing Project: Learning, Teaching, and Writing in Higher Education* (Eodice et al., 2016). The researchers surveyed 707 college seniors and determined common threads in what makes writing assignments meaningful for writers: agency, engagement, and learning for transfer.

Agency

- Balance of required elements and student choice
- Students connecting the writing to their own interests

Engagement

- Immersive experience, often over time
- Opportunities to engage with professors and classmates
- Carefully planned process; many check-ins

Learning for Transfer

- Applicable and relevant in real world
- Connects to future self and future projects
